Keeping your valuables safe

Think about making a list of your valuables and store this securely in your house. If you do get burgled then you already have a list that you can check against.

Also, think about taking out a contents insurance policy. Martin Lewis, Founder of the 'Money Savings Expert' website, has useful ideas on how to keep the cost of insurance cover as low as possible. www.moneysavingexpert.com

If you have lots of valuables, think about storing them in a safe or safe deposit box. Safe deposit boxes may incur additional costs, so always check first.

Keep any valuables out of sight. This will deter thieves, thinking it's not worth their time breaking in.

Think about marking your valuable items by using an ultraviolet pen to write your house number and postcode. If these are found after a burglary, then the Police will be able to return the stolen items to you.

Installing a CCTV camera could also be useful. However, please see the information below, as there may be additional costs to this equipment.

It may be useful to think about putting your money away in a bank or building society.



Keeping you and your house safe

Lights outside your back and front doors

There are several things that may be able to help you to see where you are going or what you are doing. For example, a keyhole light lamp (which is battery powered and has an automatic sensor motion detector) could be installed above your door keyhole to help you open and lock the door more efficiently.

Do you have a light above the doorway? This could be connected to the electricity supply in your home or choose to have one that is solar powered.

An outside motion sensor security light can also be useful to detect movement, which will turn on the light. This will help you arrive at your door safely, along with detecting anyone who could be lurking around the property.

Losing your house key

It may be useful to install a key safe box outside, which is not too conspicuous to see. Always look out for 'Secured by Design' police preferred specification if you want a police-accredited key safe. If you cannot remember the key safe code, or have written the code somewhere secure within your house, this may not be the best solution!

Who is at your door?

Can you see who is calling at your door? If not think about having one or all of the following:

A door safety chain

- Install a door safety chain but check what type of door you have as wooden or PVC doors require different chains.
- Is your house rented? If so, you may need permission from your landlord first before making any changes. Your landlord may be willing to do this for you!

A peephole

- Installing a peephole depends on the door material, for example if
 it is PVC or wood. If your house is rented you may need permission
 from your landlord before installing any changes. Your landlord may
 be willing to make these changes for you. Tell your landlord why you
 need this as you cannot hear who is at the door.
- If you have both sight and hearing loss, explain that you cannot see or hear who is at your door. Being unable to recognise who is at the door, causes increased risk for you, especially if you live on your own.



A video doorbell

Another suggestion is having a video doorbell installed. The
cost of buying one can be very expensive as there may be a
requirement to pay for subscription costs too! So always check for
extra costs.

A Wi-Fi connection and a smartphone will be required, so please check that the video doorbell you buy is compatible with your smartphone first.

There are a lot of things to consider when buying a video doorbell which you need to be aware of. For example:

- If you live on a busy street, the doorbell is likely to alert you every time someone walks past, or a car drives past.
- ▶ Some models are motion sensor.
- Some require the person to press the doorbell before it alerts you on your mobile phone.
- Is it powered by batteries or electricity?
- Always check that this is secure and not susceptible to privacy being breached.
- Check for hidden costs some may require a monthly subscription.

If you live in a rented property your landlord may be able to buy this for you - particularly if you are deaf or deafblind, at risk or vulnerable. Please ask your landlord and see what options are available.



Feeling safer at home

There is a range of indoor and outdoor CCTV cameras, with some requiring Wi-Fi and a smartphone and/or a PC. Costs can be vast and some require monthly/yearly subscriptions for cloud storage. Always check for:

- Additional monthly/yearly subscriptions that come with the package.
- ▶ The amount of storage you need.
- Is the CCTV susceptible to privacy being breached?
- Where would you install one? Is it within reach? Could an intruder easily remove it?
- ▶ If it's an outdoor camera is it waterproof?
- Make sure the CCTV camera does not invade your neighbours privacy.
- Who could install this for you? Check if you need a qualified and certified electrician.
- Does it have night and day vision?

There is a lot to think about! If you live in a rented accommodation and you're being harassed by your neighbours, do think about asking your landlord to provide you one - particularly if you are deaf or deafblind, living on your own and are at risk or vulnerable.

Check your doors and windows

Check that your doors and windows can close securely. If they cannot be closed securely, think about getting these repaired. If you live in a rented property contact your landlord as they have a duty to keep you and your contents secure.

Some windows have locks with keys. Make sure you have keys available just in case there is a fire so you can escape quickly.

Alarm systems for deaf and hard of hearing people

Derby City and Derbyshire Adults Social Care can assess your needs for an alarm system to alert you if there is a fire or if your baby is crying, if someone has rung the doorbell at your door or if the telephone is ringing. If you already have one and it's not working, contact them now to ask for a replacement or a repair. Their contact details can be found at the end of this leaflet.


Keeping your garden safe

Derbyshire Constabulary have a useful website with tips on making your garden secure in order to protect your property. Here is a list of suggestions, although it is not exhaustive:

- Using padlocks to secure items and keep your keys in a safe place.
- Buy a bolt for a garden gate, shed or garage door. Make sure you buy the correct bolt as they are all different and it will depend on the make of the gate and door you have.
- A latch with a chain and a heavy-duty padlock to secure items could also be useful.
- Think about chaining and locking your bikes up inside the garage or shed. This will deter burglars if you make it more difficult for them to steal your belongings.
- Lighting and CCTV cameras can also be a deterrent too.

Keeping you safe when outside

Hollie Guard

Download the free Hollie Guard app on your mobile phone. If you are attacked all you need to do is shake your phone. On the second shake, the phone will generate a high-pitched alarm sound with a flashing light to attract help. This should make it clear to anyone in your surrounding area that an alert has been raised and to reduce the risk of an attack. The phone will display an obvious red alert screen and capture your GPS location and audio/video footage that may be used to assess danger and collate evidence. Panic personal alarm

There are a number of personal panic alarms that have been approved by 'Secured by Design' police preferred specification if you want a police-accredited personal alarm. These can range from panic alarm keyrings, watches with a built-in panic alarm and high pitch equipment.

Keeping your identity safe

Always keep your identity safe.

Before throwing your paperwork away (e.g. your bills) you can shred all paperwork or block the identity by using marker pens.

There are fraudsters who steal people's identity to falsely open bank accounts in their names in order to take out huge loans. They empty the accounts and the debt is left with the person not knowing that this has happened until it is too late. If this has happened to you:

- Contact the Police straightaway.
- Contact the Fraud department at the bank to let them know it is not you.
- Contact your nearest advice agency who specialises in debt to ensure that this debt is disassociated from you.

Visit Fighting back against scams - Derbyshire County Council to find out what to do and keep up to date on how to protect your identity.

Do you have everything that you need to keep yourself safe?

The best way to check if you have everything you need is to contact your landlord (if you have one) and Adult Social Care services for deaf and hard of hearing people in Derby and Derbyshire.

If you need someone to install the items you may be able to contact your council-funded handy person scheme.

If it is anything electrical then think about getting a qualified and certified electrician. Go to Derbyshire's Trusted Trader.
